In the end the great participation let us pay out the top 15 spots and everyone (for the most part) went home happy. This year we'll do it again on the weekend of July 17th and 18th 2004. 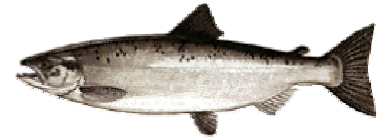

D.A.S. Trolling Season Year in Review 2003

Well ladies and gents, the D.A.S. 2003 trolling season was here and gone in a flash! This in my opinion was too fast but within this great lake state of ours it was time well spent and time that produced many lasting friendships and memories. If I had to sum up the season with one word, I guess it would be "Fantastic".

Our long awaited season came upon us in the month of April which brought on the Annual River Crab/Salmon Stakes. A great turn out was expected and thoughts prevailed. As a club we had 41 boats entered in the tournament and even with the tournament rules revised for this years event the club still didn't bring home any trophy's or monies, but a great time was had by all. Capt. Dave Roehr of Loki-One took home first place honors for the club.

One week later in May, the D.A.S. crew trucked over to the west side of the state and visited Lake Michigan and the port of St. Joe/ Benton Harbor. This year's

club catch was up from 2002's 80 total fish to 2003's 118 total fish from the 16 boats entered. The day had proven to be as usual one of the best of the year. Capt. Mike Vigus and crew of the Crusader took the first place trophy with points totaling 130.00 and Capt. Dean Meyers of Trip-n-Dipsy, picking up the heaviest fish of the day which weighed in at 19.11 lbs. A great fish for any time of the year and an exceptional fish for this early in the spring.

Next stop was back over to Lake Michigan to the port of Grand Haven. The year was shaping up in fine form and from the attendance for this tournament it was sure to be a good one. The Club brought in a whopping 174 fish to the scales and Capt. Dean Meyers took the win from this two day total weight. Capt. Bill Dunk took the big fish title both days for this weekend with King Salmon weighing 18.05 lbs the first day and a 16.15 lbs Chinook on day two.

On June 7th, 2003 the D.A.S. tournament trail rolled into Oscoda on the shores of Lake Huron. Aside from less than average reports, our guys brought home quite a few nice fish catches with Lake Trout being the top catch of the day. 144 fish brought to the scales with 87 of them being lake trout. Our 2002 Skipper of the year Capt. Chris Nytko of the Aquarius II ascended on the top spot with points totaling 99.02. Big fish pool winner was Crusader with Capt. Mike Vigus and crew bringing in a gorgeous King weighing 16.08 lbs.

After a few weeks off, the trollers of the D.A.S. showed up in Lake Huron's thumb area at the port of Harbor Beach. 94 total fish were delivered to the scales by the club fishermen, with Capt. Bill Dunk of Freebird taking

home both the win and big fish prize with a trophy Brown Trout weighing 14.15 lbs. An extraordinary fish in any great lakes fisherman's standards.

Now its time for the ladies! Our annual ladies day tournament was held this year on Lake Michigan's port of Ludington. Our lady fisherman had a great time on the water with sun and fun to be had by all. The ladies brought in some fine catches this day with Capt. Blaise Pewinski's lady crew aboard the Sea Hag taking home the trophies. The big fish of the day was caught by Jennifer Meyers aboard Trip-n-Dipsy which was the biggest fish of the year thus far and it weighed in at 22.90 lbs. Way to go Jen!!!!

It is July 9th now and it was the men's turn and back to Ludington they flocked for their turn at some of the best fishing our fishery has to offer. 129 total fish weighed with 81 of those being Chinook! Squealing reel drags, busted line and tall tails prevailed! The top finisher this day was Capt. Joe VonGrabe of the Sloppy Joe boat, with 117.85 points to take his top spot with Capt. Bill Hoffman of Stealie, boating the big fish of the day weighing 19.50 lbs.

As the year progress's the fishing in the Great Lakes turns from great to unbelievable. Manistee is one of the best fisheries on the planet this time of year and the catches in this haven prove to be spectacular. With the total club catch weight just shy of 1 ½ tons (2942 lbs.), with 25 boats entered; needless to say the fishing was unbelievable. Once again for the second time this season, Capt. Blaise Pewinski of the Sea Hag prevailed with a catch totaling 152.50 lbs and a point total of 192.50. The heaviest fish of the year was weighed at this event and Capt.

Duane Dean and crew aboard The Office took home the prize with a King Salmon (Chinook) weighing 26.30 lbs. Hope that fish looks good on your wall Duane!

Seasons end brought us back close to home and in the harbor of Port Sanilac. 25 D.A.S. trollers showed up to finish out the year with a bang. Although the fish didn't cooperate as much as many would of liked to of seen, a good time was had by all. Out of 25 boats entered in the tournament only 10 boats caught fish, leaving the other fishermen with empty creoles. Despite the tough conditions, Capt. Mike Vigus and crew of the Crusader found six nice fish to take the top honor for the second time this year with a total weight and points totaling 64.60 lbs. The big fish trophy for this event weighed 17.10 lbs and was taken by Capt. Joe VonGrabe and crew of the Sloppy Joe.

Looking back this season to me was "Fantastic". Everyone I have had the opportunity to reflect upon the season with has nothing bad to say about the fishing and undoubtedly nothing negative to say about our fine organization. Our 2003 Skipper of the Year trophy was taken home by Capt. Bill Dunk of Freebird! Congrat's to the Freebird crew from all of us at the D.A.S. In closing, everlasting memories, friendships and fishing was had by all and hope to see everyone next year and hoping a few newcomers will grace our club and enjoy or Great Lakes Fishery along with all of our membership of the Detroit Area Steelheaders. TIPS FOR BETTER FISH PICTURES

Many great fish have been caught, but far fewer great pictures of those fish are ever taken. The Detroit Area Steelheaders fine newsletter, "Fishin' Tales", is always seeking photos from our members. Unfortunately, not many good photos are given to our Editor, Bob Mitchell. Here's a few tips for taking better fish pictures.

First, you must always take a camera. It's too late to take pictures back at the car. Fish look much better immediately after the catch. Action pictures on the boat, river, surf or pier are more interesting than snapshots of stringers of dead fish at the parking lot.

Lighting is critical and usually the biggest problem. Always use the flash. It might not seem to make sense to do so on a bright sunny day, but it will make your subject really stand out. It will also eliminate the shadow on faces from the caps we all wear. Try a picture with the flash and another without to compare. You'll see a big difference. Make sure the sun is striking the subject from behind the photographer or from a slight angle. Never shoot towards the sun. Get the subject to remove their sunglasses.

Avoid background clutter. After positioning the subject for the proper light, look through the viewfinder at the background. Remove any

distracting objects, close any boat doors, hatches, etc. Change the angle of the shot if needed to avoid unwanted distractions from the background.

Think about the composition of the shot. This is the way you arrange the subjects within the picture. Do you want a closeup? (Usually it's best to be within six feet.) Or do you want the subject to be just part of the scene? The rule of thirds is a good one to remember. Do not fall into the rut of always centering the subject. Mentally divide the picture into thirds vertically and horizontally. Where the lines intersect are usually the best places to locate your subject in the picture.

Finally, experiment and have fun. Try staging some netting or releasing photos. The action passes, but great photos help us relive those great fish long into the future.

The Great Lakes Sport Fishing Council Who Are We

"We" are a confederation of organizations and individuals who have banded together in the Great Lakes region. The Great Lakes Sport Fishing Council is a nonprofit advocacy organization whose members are concerned about the present and future of sport fishing and its economic benefits in the Great Lakes ,

adjoining waters and in protecting and enhancing the regional sport fishery and its wetlands, habitat and environment.

Established in 1972, the Council has a combined membership of over 325,000 family anglers in all eight Great Lakes states and Canada. It's run by its member clubs for its members. Meetings are held in various ports on the Great Lakes, hosted by a local Council member club, and timely seminars, workshops and conferences are held on current issues.

In addition to general Council business, area reports are presented by delegates from member-clubs in various states. Much of the meeting, however, is devoted to reports by representatives--biologists, limnologists, DNR and federal agencies and organizations.
