TIPS FOR BETTER FISH PICTURES

Many great fish have been caught, but far fewer great pictures of those fish are ever taken. The Detroit Area Steelheaders fine newsletter, "Fishin' Tales", is always seeking photos from our members. Unfortunately, not many good photos are given to our Editor, Bob Mitchell. Here are a few tips for taking better fish pictures.

First, you must always take a camera. It's too late to take pictures back at the car. Fish look much better immediately after the catch. Action pictures on the boat, river, surf or pier are more interesting than snapshots of stringers of dead fish at the parking lot.

Lighting is critical and usually the biggest problem. Always use the flash. It might not seem to make sense to do so on a bright sunny day, but it will make your subject really stand out. It will also eliminate the shadow on faces from the caps we all wear. Try a picture with the flash and another without to compare. You'll see a big difference. Make sure the sun is striking the subject from behind the photographer or from a slight angle. Never shoot towards the sun. Get the subject to remove their sunglasses.

Avoid background clutter. After positioning the subject for the proper light, look through the viewfinder at the background. Remove any distracting objects; close any boat doors, hatches, etc. Change the angle of the shot if needed to avoid unwanted distractions from the background.

Think about the composition of the shot. This is the way you arrange the subjects within the picture. Do you want a close-up? (Usually it's best to be within six feet.) Or do you want the subject to be just part of the scene? The rule of thirds is a good one to remember. Do not fall into the rut of always centering the subject. Mentally divide the picture into thirds vertically and horizontally. Where the lines intersect are usually the best

places to locate your subject in the picture.

FISH ON!

When you hit a nice fish, mark the spot and go back. Often times the action takes place in a relatively small area. Don't keep going and miss the bite.

When you have a release, your second action should be to try to get another similar lure to the same depth. A hooked fish will excite others with him often triggering a double if there is a second lure. One crewmember grabs the rod and another resets another downrigger to the depth.

Troll in an "S" pattern – you'll be going faster on the outside rods and slower inside. Watch to see which the fish prefer and adjust your speed.

Speed – In general fish as fast as you can and still catch fish. At 2.6 mph you will put your lures in front of 30% more fish than at 2mph. After 6 hours a boat going 2.5 will have fished 3 additional miles of water (15 Vs 12). The tougher the fishing, the faster you should go to present your lures to more fish.

A key to consistency is to be able to repeat success – If you don't have a line counter, half hitch a rubber band to your dipsey/ lead line so you can repeat the line out after landing a fish.



CHEAP IS FOR CHUMPS

Line – Use a good, brand name line. Strip off 10-20 feet to start the day with fresh line. Run the last 3-5 feet between your fingers to feel for nicks every time before resetting after catching a fish. Use a Trilene knot for strength. If you feel ‘anything’, cut it off & change it. The biggest king of the day will always hit the rod you thought was “good enough”.

Use good terminal tackle – Use Sampo swivels. Don’t lose a \$12 hootchie combo because you had a 25-cent swivel.

Sharpen your hooks. It’s the single easiest way to improve your percent landed and the most ignored. See Mark’s article for how to sharpen. Go 8 for 10 not 5 for 10.

Lures – Use quality lures that you have confidence in. Run the same brand at the best (tested) speed. Mix and match and some won’t be running right.

Be versatile – learn to use Dipseys/ Lead Dropper weights, wire line, cow bells, dodgers, and hootchies. Anyone, who says, “I never run...” will also have times when they don’t catch.

Fish tournaments – It’s the single best way to learn to fish. Go out & do your thing. Then have a ‘dog and talk to the skippers who were more successful. Don’t just ask what they did. Ask “WHY” they did that.

EFFICIENCY

A pole out of the water will not catch fish. Pick out the lure you want and then pull the rod.

It’s better to run fewer lines right than more wrong. If the wind is blowing hard, fish with the wind,

Then pick up and run back rather than trying to troll into the wind.

Try to net behind the downrigger wires. Every time you bring a fish in-between the wires you risk him making a last gasp dash & cutting you off.

Short leads give more maneuverability. Long leads and lead lines limit your ability to go where you need to go. The more traffic the more important. And if you start catching fish traffic will show up.

Add-a-lines –use no more than 3 footers. The bow in the line will get it back from the boat. Big Swivel at one end and small at the other. The really big swivel will be easier to undo when there is a big fish on and everyone is pumped. Hold in place with a rubber band half hitched to the main line.

Keep a log - Don’t trust your memory. Two hours ago, Yesterday, Last year.

Test lures by running a lure 4 feet back and 2 feet down so you can see how it runs at different speeds. Record the speeds in your log.

Test Dipseys– Know what depth Dipseys or lead balls run at Vs various speeds and leads. Move into a shallow sandy area 50 to 75 feet deep. Let line out until they start bumping the bottom. Enter the speed and depth in your logbook.

FIND THE FISH

Find a break – A “break” of some kind will concentrate fish. A break can be a temperature change – thermocline or thermal bar – (offshore temp break) drop off, wreck, current, color line (river water), etc. Look for a slick, a sea gull, a reflection, anything that might indicate a break.

Bird feeder – If you watch a bird feeder there are times when there are no birds there, but they always come back.

Find fish and there will likely be others there. When it slacks off – leave but come back from time to time; especially after the other boats leave. Running and gunning rarely pays off.

You will sometimes find baitfish where you won’t find salmon. You will almost never find salmon where you don’t find baitfish.

WATER SCIENCE

Temperature – 54 degrees is a magic number for water. There are actually three magic numbers where the physical properties of water change- 32 degrees (ice) 212 degrees (steam) and 54 degrees (density). The physical change at 54 degrees leads to thermoclines and also to the Fall turnover in a lake. Find the thermocline and you have a break that is often a clue to baitfish and salmon. They may be above or below it.

Color

- Spectrum of light – Red/ Orange/ Yellow/ Green/ Blue. Red is visible as red to only about 15 –20 feet deep, then any deeper it looks black. Blue is visible as blue to the greatest depths; maybe 80 feet. The order follows the rainbow spectrum listed above. White (all colors)/ Black (absence of color) work about anywhere.

Real silver plated spoons or dodgers are better at greater depths than chrome because silver reflects more blue light than chrome or nickel.

Glow tape or paint doesn’t care about depth. Often, a little glow out-performs a lot of glow.
